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FOREWORD BY THE NATIONAL COMMISSIONER OF THE SOUTH AFRICAN POLICE SERVICE



The South African Police Service (SAPS) is proud to present our Annual Report for the financial year 1 April 2006 to 31 March 2007, which is again dedicated to the heroic men and women in blue who make many sacrifices in order to serve the people of this country.

The SAPS is a growing establishment. During the year under review 9 827 entry-level constables successfully completed the Basic Training Learning Programme and graduated from the various police training institutions throughout the country. A total number of 15 164 police members completed the Street Survival Learning Programme which is essential to ensure that our operational members are well prepared to protect themselves and their colleagues while performing policing duties. It is also gratifying to note

that 35 285 new reservists were recruited, which brings the total number of reservists to 44 356.

The management of the SAPS is committed to ensuring that our police service uses the best and most modern technology to prevent and combat crime and has, to this end and inter alia-

- installed a Genetic Sample Processing System at the Forensic Science Laboratory in Pretoria which is used for DNA analysis
- established a Biometric Identification and Enhancement Solutions capability within the Criminal Record Centre to deal with biometrics, which will facilitate the identification of criminals
- established a High-Technology Project Centre to coordinate information and the utilisation of skills and technology to support investigators identifying suspects, to oppose bail, apprehend wanted persons and establish links between cases of a serious nature.

The SAPS continued, during the financial year in question, to intensify our efforts to prevent the proliferation of illegal firearms and to remove them from society. Over thirteen thousand lost or stolen firearms (13 120) were confiscated/recovered. Lost and stolen firearms invariably

land up in the hands of criminal elements and are often used in the commission of serious and violent offences - the efficient control of firearms through the Firearms Strategy is therefore of the utmost importance.

During the 2006/2007 financial year, over a million crime-related fingerprint enquiries were received at the Criminal Record Centre, as well as 912 710 non-crime related fingerprint enquiries. A total of 168 732 ballistic cases were received and 48 670 biology cases were finalised by the Forensic Science Laboratory.

It is, therefore, evident that the members and management of the SAPS remain committed to serving the community - some members even sacrificed their own lives while doing so in 2006/2007. We cherish their memories and will continue to serve and protect the public in their honour.

INFORMATION ON THE MINISTRY FOR SAFETY AND SECURITY



In terms of section 206(1) of the Constitution, 1996 (Act No. 108 of 1996), the Minister for Safety and Security is responsible for policing in general, and is required to account to Cabinet and Parliament about all matters relating to policing. Important facets of the Minister's responsibility include determining the national policing policy and providing civilian oversight.

Institutions that report to the Minister for Safety and Security:

- **The South African Police Service**
Purpose: To create a safe and secure environment for all people in South Africa.
- **The Secretariat for Safety and Security**
Purpose: To provide support to the Minister in carrying out his duties.

- **The Independent Complaints Directorate**

Purpose: To investigate, as an independent police complaints body, alleged misconduct of, or alleged offences committed by a member(s) of the South African Police Service.

- **The Private Security Industry Regulatory Authority**

Purpose: To provide, as a statutory authority, for the regulation of the private security industry. The Authority is accountable to the Minister for Safety and Security and the Minister has supervisory powers over the Authority.

to the Bill. The draft Regulations will be published in the Gazette for public comment.

The South African Police Service Act, 1995 (Act No. 68 of 1995), the National Key Points Act, 1980 (Act No. 102 of 1980), and the Second-hand Goods Act, 1955 (Act No. 23 of 1955) are at present under review with a view to submitting revised legislation to Cabinet and Parliament.

ADMINISTRATION OF LEGISLATION

The Department monitors the listings of individuals or entities who are listed by the United Nations Security Council as suspected members of Al-Qaida and the Taliban or of having links with these organisations, and prepared Proclamations for the President for publication in the Gazette. The Proclamations must, in terms of section 25 of the Protection of Constitutional Democracy against Terrorist and Related Activities Act, 2004 (Act No. 33 of 2004) be published in the Gazette. The complete updated and consolidated list of the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1267 Committee is published and thereafter additions, deletions or amendments are published once a press statement in this regard has been issued by the Security Council of the United Nations.

LEGISLATION

During the past financial year, the Minister for Safety and Security introduced the Firearms Control Amendment Bill, 2006 (Act No. of 2006) in Parliament. The Bill was approved by both Houses of Parliament. The Parliamentary processes in respect of the Bill have been concluded, but the Bill has not yet been signed into law by the President.

The Bill provides that it be put into operation by the President by Proclamation in the Gazette. The South African Police Service is in the process of drafting regulations to give effect

Proclamations were published in terms of section 25 of the said Act on the following dates:

- 29 May 2006, in Gazette No. 28885 (Complete updated Consolidated List of the Committee and additions - two Proclamations)
- 19 September 2006, in Gazette No. 29222
- 11 October 2006, in Gazette No. 29284
- 22 December 2006, in Gazette No. 29500
- 7 February 2007, in Gazette No. 29598 (Two Proclamations)

In terms of the said Act all such Proclamations must be tabled in Parliament for such action as Parliament may deem fit. The above Proclamations were tabled in terms of section 26 of the Protection of Constitutional Democracy against Terrorist and Related Activities Act, 2004, (Act No. 33 of 2004) in Parliament on 29 March 2007. The Portfolio Committee for Safety and Security was briefed during the reporting period on the Proclamations tabled during the previous reporting period.

INTERNATIONAL INSTRUMENTS

Conventions

In respect of international instruments, the Minister for Safety and Security has submitted, for Parliament's approval, the International Convention for the Suppression of Acts of Nuclear Terrorism and the African Union Protocol to the OAU Convention on the Prevention and Combating of Terrorism. Both Houses of Parliament approved the said instruments in terms of section 231(2) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996. Instruments of ratification in respect of both international instruments have been prepared, submitted to the President and signed. The instruments of ratification in respect of both instruments have already been deposited through the Department of Foreign Affairs.

Police Cooperation Agreement

A Memorandum of Understanding on police cooperation between the Republic of South Africa and the United Arab Emirates was concluded and signed in Pretoria by the Minister for Safety and Security and the responsible Minister of the United Arab Emirates on 25 April 2006. The Memorandum of Understanding was tabled in Parliament in terms of section 231(3) of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996, and the respective Parliamentary Committees were briefed on it.

- use our resources in the best way possible
- develop the skills of all members through equal opportunity
- cooperate with the community, all levels of Government and other role-players

CORE OBJECTIVES BASED ON CONSTITUTIONAL AND OTHER LEGISLATIVE AND FUNCTIONAL MANDATES

The Constitutional mandate of the Department for Safety and Security and the South African Police Service (SAPS) is reflected in section 205 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 (Act No. 108 of 1996). The objects of policing in terms of section 205 are to –

- prevent, combat and investigate crime
- maintain public order
- protect and secure the inhabitants of the Republic and their property
- to uphold and enforce the law.

The Minister for Safety and Security is responsible for the administration of the following Acts:

- South African Police Service Act, 1995 (Act No. 68 of 1995)
- Protection of Constitutional Democracy Against Terrorist and Related Activities Act, 2004 (Act No. 33 of 2004)

- Firearms Control Act, 2000 (Act No. 60 of 2000)
- Explosives Act, 1956 (Act No. 26 of 1956)
- Tear-gas Act, 1964 (Act No. 16 of 1964)
- Dangerous Weapons Act, 1968 (Act No. 71 of 1968)
- Control of Access to Public Premises and Vehicles Act, 1985 (Act No. 53 of 1985)
- National Key Points Act, 1980 (Act No. 102 of 1980)
- Intimidation Act, 1982 (Act No. 72 of 1982)
- Second-hand Goods Act, 1955 (Act No. 23 of 1955)
- The Private Security Industry Regulation Act, 2001 (Act No. 56 of 2001)

The South African Police Service is responsible for the prevention, combating and investigation of any common-law crime or crime contained in a plethora of Statutes. There is no limit in the Constitution in respect of the objects of the SAPS as set out in section 205 of the Constitution: the SAPS is obliged to prevent, combat and investigate all crimes.

The SAPS derives its main powers from the following key Acts:

- The Criminal Procedure Act, 1977 (Act No. 51 of 1977)
- The Interception and Monitoring Prohibition Act, 1992 (Act No. 127 of 1992)
- The National Strategic Intelligence Act, 1994 (Act No. 39 of 1994)
- The Domestic Violence Act, 1998 (Act No. 116 of 1998)
- The Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, 2004 (Act No. 12 of 2004)

SOUTH AFRICAN POLICE SERVICE CODE OF CONDUCT

I commit myself to creating a safe and secure environment for all people in South Africa by –

- participating in endeavours aimed at addressing the cause of crime
- preventing all acts which may threaten the safety or security of any community
- investigating criminal conduct which endangers the safety or security of the community, and
- bringing the perpetrators to justice.

In carrying out this commitment, I shall at all times –

- uphold the Constitution and the law
- take into account the needs of the community
- recognise the needs of the South African Police Service as my employer, and
- cooperate with all interested parties in the community and the government at every level.

In order to achieve a safe and secure environment for all the people of South Africa I undertake to –

- act with integrity in rendering an effective service of a high standard which is accessible to everybody, and continuously strive towards improving this service
- utilise all available resources responsibly, efficiently and cost-effectively to optimise their use
- develop my own skills and contribute towards the development of those of my colleagues to ensure equal opportunities for all
- contribute to the reconstruction and development of, and reconciliation in our country
- uphold and protect the fundamental rights of every person
- act in a manner that is impartial, courteous, honest, respectful, transparent and accountable
- exercise the powers conferred upon me in a responsible and controlled manner, and
- work towards preventing any form of corruption and to bring the perpetrators thereof to justice.

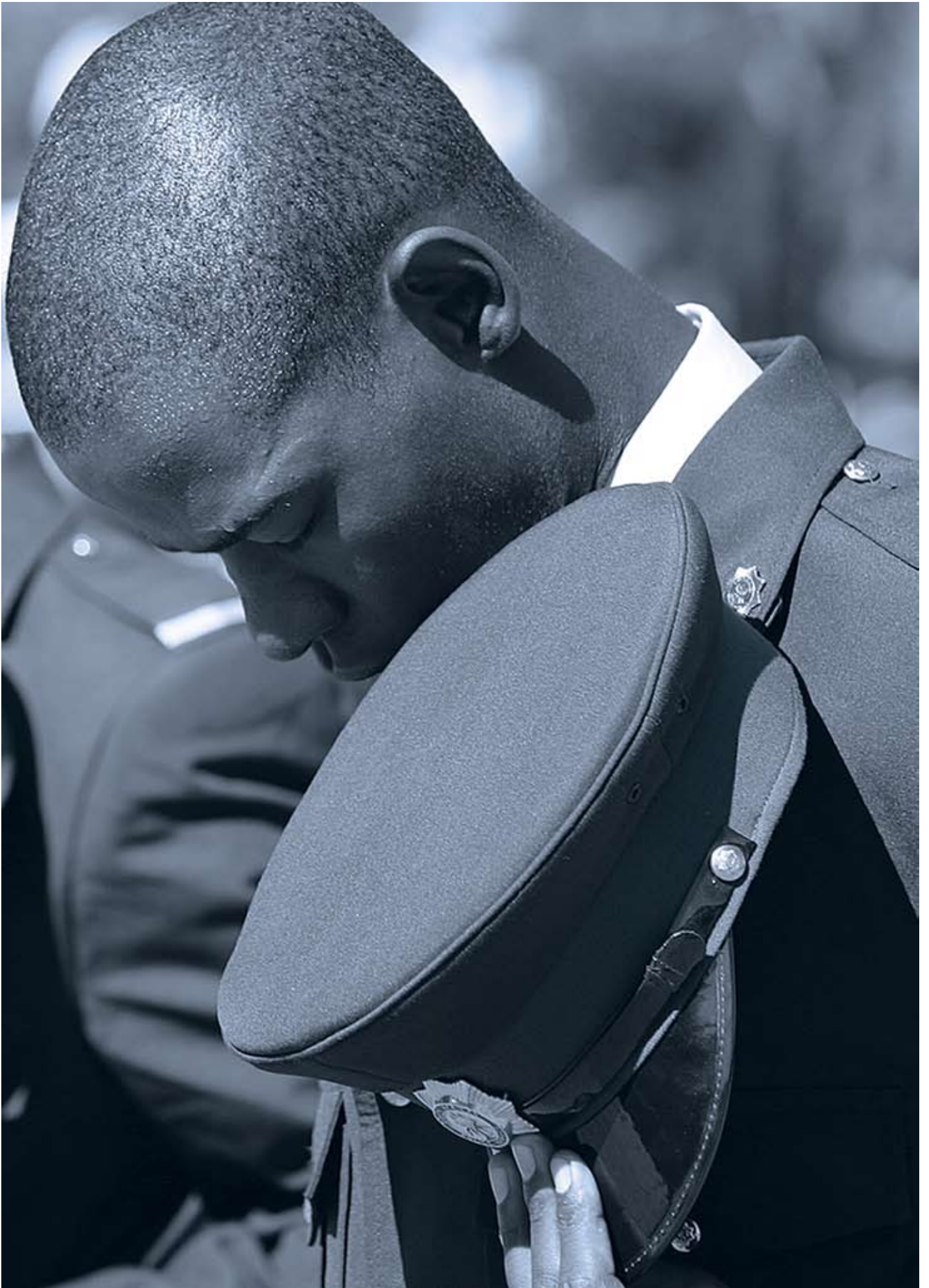
