MINISTER MCHUNU ENGAGED STAKEHOLDERS TO CURB STOCK THEFT

ON A JOURNEY TO A SAFER SOUTH AFRICA

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Greetings to all our wonderful readers. Welcome to the March Edition of your favourite magazine.

We have come to the conclusion of our financial year as the SAPS. We are proud of the safety and security effort we have done in the 2024/2025 period. The third

quarter crime statistics revealed that serious crimes decreased by 5.0% which translates to 21 588 counts. There was decrease in 17 community-reported crimes, such as contact crime by 1,6%. Also in the same quarter, murder decreased by 9,8 % translating to 757 counts compared to the 2023/2024 financial year. This decrease marks the highest ever decrease in the past five years across all the quarters.

Most of these reductions are a result of heightened police visibility, which intensified suspect raiding, stop and searches as well as thorough detective work which led to convictions and removal of hardened criminals from the streets of South Africa. In this new financial year, 2025/2026 we hope to continue expanding in fighting the scourge of crime in this country, through strengthening our collaboration with multi-stakeholders.

To achieve this, the Southern African Development Community (SADC) member states gathered with stakeholders for the development of South Africa's National Strategy to Prevent and Combat Transnational Organised Crime (TOC). The meeting underscored the urgent need for law enforcement agencies to enhance their planning, strategic approach, cooperation and collaboration, while adopting swiftly to the evolving criminal landscape. You will find this interesting read on page 3 of the magazine.

On page 6, Minister Senzo Mchunu met with farmers, Community Policing Forum and farmers unions from different provinces in Bloemfontein to engage on how to curb stock theft, particularly in the Eastern Cape, Limpopo, KwaZulu-Natal and the Free State. During the Ministerial Stock Theft Stakeholder Engagement, farmers across the spectrum registered their concerns and displeasures they are experiencing through stock theft.

A new state of the art police station was opened in Phaudi in the Capricorn District, Limpopo. Phaudi Police Station is expected to serve 36 villages across Moletjie. It is equipped with full range of services that includes a Victim-Friendly Room to accommodate victims and survivors of gender-based violence. The police station is evidence that the government is expanding the footprint of law enforcement in areas with high crime volumes. You will read all of this on page 8.

NEW STATE OF THE ART POLICE STATION FOR PHAUDI COMMUNITY

Jubilation was in the air when the community of Phaudi in Limpopo witnessed the opening of a new police station. The state of the art police station was handed over by the Minister of Police, Mr Senzo Mchunu, accompanied by Deputy Ministers of Police, Mr Cassel Mathale and Ms Polly Boshieo; National Commissioner of SAPS, General Fannie Masemola and the Provincial Commissioner, Lt General Thembi Hadebe.

As part of expanding the footprint of law enforcement in areas with high crime volumes, the Phaudi Police Station was handed over to service communities of Phaudi and surrounding areas in the Capricorn District on 14 March 2025. The station is equipped with modern infrastructure and technology aimed at improving police services. Phaudi Police Station is expected to serve 36 villages across Moletjje. It is equipped with full range of services that includes a Victim-Friendly Room to accommodate victims and survivors of gender-based violence. The station is staffed by trained police officials, with Captain Mabena introduced as the new Station Commander.

Minister Mchunu expressed that as police they ask God's blessing to bring upon peace and stability in the Phaudi community, Capricorn District, Limpopo and South Africa as a whole. "We are praying for power to remove crime and the criminals. We are here to ask God to give us direction and wisdom to remove crime and criminals from this area, so that there is peace and stability. So that we continue to receive blessings from God unhindered and undisturbed. I do indeed add that God give us wisdom and power to remove criminals from amongst ourselves because as long as criminals are there, crime will be there.

“Those of you who are here and are criminals, we are asking God to remove you from amongst ourselves. You can be removed temporarily. We will welcome that when you get arrested and go to jail, but if needs be, we pray that you would be removed permanently, so that we can have permanent peace and stability, as long as you resist your removal from our communities,” emphasized Minister Mchunu.

The Minister explained that the government, under the leadership of President Cyril Ramaphosa are making an effort in delivering service to people. He said that the new police station is a service because it is beyond the building as it will be services that will be delivered from the facility. The police station will deliver peace and stability in a form of all the services that South African Police Service (SAPS) are mandated to deliver. He indicated that decisions to arrest criminals will be taken at the police station openly.

“When we arrest, we arrest individuals. Whether acting as a group, but we arrest them one by one. Whether you act alone, we go for you. It doesn’t matter how far or fast you run, we will find you and arrest you. The men and women in blue are trained to arrest you and they know how to do it and when to do it. Even if you plan criminality for months and indeed execute it, we will get to know each detail of where you were when you planned it,” Minister Mchunu explained.

The Minister told the community gathered that the station has guns and they work. The firearms are not toy guns. He encouraged the police officials stationed at Phaudi to use the firearms against criminals before criminals use their guns on them. “Not only are you blessed in this uniform and for the hours that you are on duty. The firearms that you are carrying are also blessed. So that they are used properly, where they are required to be used and that’s on criminals. You know when to use them, especially when you have to use maximum force,” said the Minister.

The newly appointed Station Commander, Captain P Mabena who will start working on 01 April 2025 excited stated that she was born and grew up in Limpopo and she’s able to speak Sesotho, Selobedu and Xitsonga, so language won’t be a barrier when she engages with the different communities. “I feel the community still trust the police and work with police very well. Coming to that, I am very excited that we will work well together and fight crime, especially against children and women.” She promised the people that she will work hand in hand with them and she will provide feedback on whatever matters that are reported to the police.

The opening of the police station is in line with government’s commitment to provide policing services in high density areas and bring policing services closer to communities. A community engagement session followed the official opening of the station and the process was facilitated by the Deputy Minister of Police, Ms Polly Boshielo. Community members were given an opportunity to raise questions or comments to SAPS and provincial leadership, which included Kgoshi Kgabo Moloto wa Boraro of the Batlhaloga tribe; the MEC for Transport and Community Safety, Ms Violet Mathye; Capricorn District Executive Mayor, Cllr Mamedupi Teffo; Molemole Local Municipality Speaker, Cllr M Rathaga.

A cheerful community member, Ms Mkgadi Selota said she is happy that a new police station was opened close her village. “I am happy with the new police station because we use to travel far to report cases and you needed to have money to get transport to get us there. It was difficult. I hope the police will deal with the house breaking problem in our communities, so we can feel safe again.”

MINISTER MCHUNU ENGAGED STAKEHOLDERS TO CURB STOCK THEFT

In a bid to curb the rampant scourge of theft of livestock in the country, particularly in the Eastern Cape, Limpopo, KwaZulu-Natal and the Free State, Minister of Police, Mr Senzo Mchunu hosted a Ministerial Stock Theft Stakeholder Engagement. The engagement took place in Bloemfontein on 20 March 2025.

The Minister was flanked by Deputy Minister Cassel Mathale, the Executive Mayor of Mangaung, Mr Gregory Nthatsi, MECs from the three provinces, National Commissioner, General Fannie Masemola, South African Police Service (SAPS) Management Community Policing Forum and farmers unions from different provinces. The purpose of the engagement was to discuss the escalating scourge of stock theft, review current intervention measures, and explore additional strategies to combat this type of crime, which continues to have a devastating effect on local economy, communities and the farmers concerned.

The National Commissioner, General Fannie Masemola expressed his hope that the stakeholders will exchange ideas to fight stock theft. "Stock theft is a major issue in South Africa, particularly in rural areas where livestock farming is a key part of the economy. It affects commercial and subsistence farmers' alike, leading to significant financial loss." The National Commissioner went on to highlight that there was a bit of a small relief from the recent release of the crime statistics which revealed that there is a 4.5 percent decrease in the theft of livestock across the country. However, the Free State, Eastern Cape and KwaZulu-Natal are still facing challenges.

Terming criminals as an 'emerging sub-nation,' Minister Mchunu said the focus should be on them. "The police, stakeholders and upright citizens should work together and get rid of this sub-nation," said Minister Mchunu. He echoed that proper structures should be established and report at least quarterly at national level. He even alluded that they are reviewing the crime statistics structure to create a distinction among the crimes taking place at farms, smallholdings and communal land.

During the engagements, farmers across the spectrum registered their concerns and displeasures they are experiencing through stock theft in their respective provinces. Most of these farmers complained that the police take longer to respond to their plight while some suggested that the police are in cahoots with the criminals who steal their livestock. "The problem that we have is that the police don't do their job. Some of them are criminals and some Station Commanders work with these criminals," said Mr Petros Sitho, from Rural Farm Guard Alliance in the Eastern Cape.

Most farmers decried that the police are not on board, stating that they are able to find their stolen livestock in six hours but the police cannot do that in six months, even with their specialised training. "Farmers Forums are the ones who find our stolen livestock, while we opened cases with the police. We also advised them to use latest technology but they do not listen," said Rabanyane Sechaba from Young Farmers Association.

Mr Pitso Sekgoto representing Agri-Unity Sector Forum (ASUF) who lost 120 cattle in Free State appealed to Minister Mchunu to invest in structures that will benefit both farmers and the police in curbing stock theft. "We meet almost year in year out, talking the same thing. I thought when we came here we will get Rural Safety Strategy so that we can check how far we have come. Let us engage in structures, so

that when somebody does wrong, we report them to that structure," said Mr Sekgoto.

Minister Mchunu conceded that there are grey areas within the service and the engagement is part of the solutions to curb the problem. "We have to create synergies between the structures on the ground so that they can link up with the structures at provinces and national. Meetings like these must not be incidental, we have to get it on our systems," explained Minister Mchunu.

He further indicated about the significant prevalence of crime in rural areas, but emphasised that it needs a sustainable way of dealing with it. He reassured all stakeholders involved that various strategies are under review to strengthen policing and accountability, prosecution and boarder management.

He concluded by indicating that they are looking at strengthening the combative side of policing to be equal to the criminality in the country. "If you are questioning us whether we are really biting on crime or we are massaging, we do not have to explain ourselves, but it will be explained by what you feel and what you see on the ground," stressed the Minister.

SA BOLSTERS STRATEGY TO PREVENT AND COMBAT TRANSNATIONAL ORGANISED CRIME

The Southern African Development Community (SADC) member states with multi-stakeholders congregated for a week-long session for the development of South Africa's National Strategy to Prevent and Combat Transnational Organised Crime (TOC) on 03 - 07 March 2025 in Pretoria. TOC constitutes a major threat to regional peace, security, stability, governance and development in Southern Africa. According to SADC, over the past decades, the region has witnessed a significant increase in organised crime, which has expanded opportunities for highly organised and rapacious criminal networks and organisations with debilitating consequences across the region.

Ms T Gumede who is a Senior Officer in Southern African Regional Police Chiefs Co-operation Organisation and SADC Secretariat said it is widely recognised that modern organised crime syndicates are well structured and deeply connected and continuously strategising to expand their illicit operations. As a result they have become increasingly sophisticated and very proactive and obstruct the course of justice. "This concerning reality underscores the urgent need for law enforcement agencies to enhance their planning, strategic approach, cooperation and collaboration, while adopting swiftly to the evolving criminal landscape.

"Law enforcement agencies must be dynamic, well organised, focused and unified to out manoeuvre criminal sophistication and dismantle its life force. This importance of continuously monitoring the police environment, conducting thorough threat assessments and regularly updating strategies cannot be over emphasized. This is the reason why this national multi-stakeholder workshop for the development of South Africa's Strategy to handle transnational organised crime is of paramount importance, not only to South Africa, but also for the region in general," Ms Gumede explained.

Deputy National Police for Crime Detection, Lt Gen Shadrack Sibiyi welcomed the delegates to the South African Police Service (SAPS) strategic planning session. He said seeing the presence of many people representing various sectors, agencies and nations gathered together demonstrates shared commitment to tackling one of the most pressing security challenges of our time. He indicated that

TOC knows no borders. It thrives on the vulnerabilities within our societies, exploiting gaps in governance, law enforcement and economic stability. Whether it manifests in human trafficking, drug smuggling, cybercrime or financial fraud, its consequences are profound, affecting the safety, stability and prosperity of communities worldwide.

"Today, we come together not just to discuss these challenges and gaps, but to forge a unified, proactive and strategic approach, guided by the SADC Integrated Strategy to Prevent and Combat Transnational Organised Crime. The Strategy is designed to complement national and international strategies, action plans and relevant legislative and legal agreements that SADC member states have entered into, in the file of TOC, with a view to prevent, combat and stem the threats posed by transnational, serious and organised crimes.

"So, the goal ladies and gentlemen, is not only to identify emerging threats but also to strengthen cross-border collaboration, enhance intelligence-sharing and develop innovative countermeasures," Lt Gen Sibiyi stated.

Opening the session, the National Commissioner of SAPS, General Fannie Masemola agreed with the speakers affirmed that the collective mission of the multi-stakeholders is to disrupt and dismantle criminal networks that undermine security, stability and prosperity across borders. He mentioned that criminal enterprises are adaptive, using sophisticated methods such as cryptocurrency, laundering, deep fake technology and encrypted communication. They exploit jurisdictional gaps, weak regulatory frameworks and corruption making international cooperation not just an option but a necessity. The Commissioner did highlight that even though they are gathered to form a strategy that aligns with that of the SADC, South Africa has not been sitting idle as all these networks affect us.

General Masemola highlighted that the SAPS' Special Task Force (STF) unit rescued 90 undocumented Ethiopian nationals who were allegedly being kept against their will and under inhumane conditions in Sunnyside Ridge, Johannesburg. A multidisciplinary team led by the STF were tracing a victim of kidnapping for ransom when they also made the discovery of the undocumented nationals who were found locked up, confined and packed into rooms. The Ethiopian nationals were all taken to hospital for medical care and two alleged human traffickers and kidnappers who were found on the property were arrested.

He further detailed that the Durban harbour in KwaZulu-Natal has seen some of our biggest drug busts in the past year. "Let me single out an SAPS intelligence led operation, which had our intelligence structure work with other intelligence structures from countries abroad for a two month period, the culmination of which was the recovery of cocaine which was hidden and transported in paint containers. The containers were from Brazil and destined to South Africa, where they would be then transported to Gauteng and there, the distribution would take place. The cocaine was worth over R80 million," General Masemola explained.

He pointed out that the scale and impact of the crimes are staggering. Yet, despite the growing complexity of these threats, the responses must remain unwavering. All parties involved cannot afford complacency. They must act decisively, collaboratively and innovatively.

"Ladies and gentlemen, the fight against transnational organised crime is not one nation's burden. It is a shared global responsibility. We must reinforce our partnerships, innovate our strategies and remain steadfast in our commitment to justice and security, said General Masemola.

As the week progressed with engagements, Special Advisor to the Ministry of Police, Adv. Vusi Pikoli advised that it was urgently important to craft a roadmap which will outline the timelines for the implementation of the proposed strategy for such implementation to materialise in the next six months. "We must establish the national task force for the implementation of this strategy, but I am satisfied that we spent a whole week developing a strategic framework going forward," said Adv. Pikoli.

Giving feedback during the plenary session, Maj Gen Duncan Scott, VOP: Border Policing, said it was significant to strengthen border security through the use of modern technology given the advent of the 4th Industrial Revolution, to be able to break down criminal syndicates. He emphasised that it will only be possible by working in tandem with other industry role players including the Border Management Authority (BMA), an entity from the Department of Home Affairs. "We must create our own joint forces and committees to strengthen border security among our own six neighbouring countries and beyond. In this regard we will need all role players on board including financial institutions," said Maj Gen Scott.

He added that often there are large consignments of drugs coming into the country from far afield such as Brazil and Mexico, illegal mining taking place across the region, human trafficking and other illegal activities which calls for the need to strengthen South Africa's ports of entries. "It is an urgent need to tighten up our border management so that we can cripple the financial lines for these criminals. Our task is to protect human rights of all citizens within SADC," he said.

Despite several measures adopted by the SADC since the 1990s to tackle crimes through a concerted approach, the region remains host to numerous criminal markets, which attract both local and international criminal groups. The continued fragility and declining resilience of the region, remains a serious concern for SADC. The Strategy aims to reinvigorate and operationalise a concerted regional framework to preventing and combating transnational, serious and organised crimes, and to mitigate their impacts on population and the economy of the region.

It focuses on promoting and strengthening national and regional resilience against TOC through a robust and effective rule of law framework; strong governance based on democratic practices, inclusive and equitable policies; a strong culture of implementation of national, regional and international instruments on matters relating to organised crime. It is based on a theory of change that emphasizes the need for a change in the perception and greater understanding of organised crime in Southern Africa, and action in seven priority areas,

to achieve its objectives and strategic vision of a united and resilient SADC region free of TOC, in which peace, security, democracy and development flourish.

DEPUTY MINISTER MATHALE LAUNCHES CAMPUS COMMUNITY SAFETY FORUM

With the resolve to collaborate with institutions of higher learning to provide a safe and secure learning environment at campuses across the country, Deputy Minister of Police, Mr Cassel Mathale presided over the launch of the Campus Community Safety Forum (CCSF) at the University of Free State (UFS), Bloemfontein Campus, from 12-13 March 2025.

The objectives of the two-day engagement was to, among others, conduct a capacity-building workshop on the Learning Environment Safety Framework, officially launch the Campus Community Safety Forum, as well as implementing and operationalising the approved Learning Environment Safety Framework at various campuses nationwide. The expected outcomes are to produce a comprehensive report on stakeholder commitments and security strategies, establishing and officially launching the Campus Community Safety Forum at UFS, successfully rolling out the approved Learning Environment Safety Framework and as well as strengthening partnerships between key security stakeholders.

Students across the country have been experiencing their share of incidents such as robberies, gender-based violence and femicide, murder, attempted murder and break-ins. This prompted the government to initiate a comprehensive campus safety strategy to provide a safe and secure environment to students, academics, staff and guests inside campuses and student residents on and off the campus. It is believed that the CCFS national launch will tackle such incidents and realise the government's objective in securing places of higher learning, teaching and academic research and the communities around various campuses.

During his keynote address, Deputy Minister Mathale noted that the launch of the University of the Free State's Campus Community Safety Forum is a great step as the government endeavours to ensure the safety of all our citizens especially the leaders and professionals in institutions of higher learning.

"Safety in the Learning Environment remains a key Priority of the South African Police Service (SAPS). It is for that reason that since 2018, the SAPS started consulting with various stakeholders on the subject matter. This growing concern compelled the SAPS to come up with ways to respond to the growing criminal activities in Institutions of Higher Learning, inclusive of private student residential place. As much as we are aware that it is our Constitutional mandate as the SAPS to create a safe and secure environment for all who live in South Africa, we are also equally aware that SAPS alone cannot win the fight against crime and criminality. We need a holistic approach that involves all the stakeholders. In this instance, we need the whole university community to play a role.

"I must applaud the warm and enthusiastic reception of the UFS. From the first moment this partnership was initiated in 2018, this institution was willing to come on-board. I am also aware and appreciative of your contribution towards this launch today. As the organisation, we are fully mindful of the fact that we need you to be part of us in an endeavor to better the crime situation in and around this institution. Institutions of Higher Learning are a microcosm of the community. Trends and activities taking place within the community tend to manifest within the institutions as well. Therefore, we believe that all our crime-fighting interventions developed for the

community at large must extend to the institutions as well,” stated Deputy Minister Mathale.

He further implored the campus safety team to familiarise itself with the Integrated Crime and Violence Prevention Strategy (ICVPS) which was adopted by Cabinet in 2022. The Strategy advocates for government and societal approach in fighting crime and preventing violence. It is the overarching strategy, encompassing all other related strategies (144 legislations and policies were examined and aligned in this process).

“I would also like to express our support as the Ministry of Police for the strategic interventions that have been put in place by the South African Police Services, in partnership with the Department of Higher Education and Training, the academia, especially the UFS as well as other stakeholders-which have culminated in the establishment of the Campus Community Safety Forum we are launching today.”

Charting the purpose of the event, the Acting Deputy National Commissioner for Support Services, Lt Gen Lineo Nkhua agreed that the University Campus Safety is an important topic while ensuring a safe environment that involves a combination of campus policies, security measures and personal awareness.

“In March of 2022, we held a Learning Environment Safety Summit at the Tshwane University of Technology’s Mbombela Campus in Mpumalanga. The summit brought together various stakeholders responsible for safety in educational institutions in order to make order to make meaningful contributions. Emanating from that Learning Environment Safety Summit, the SAPS developed the

Learning Environment Safety Framework (LESF) approved in 2023. We also established the Vice-Chancellor Forum, chaired by the SAPS’ Divisional Commissioner of Human Resource Development. Consequently, the SAPS continues to engage with institutions of higher learning across the country in order to establish safety structures in the form of Campus Community Safety Forums which are essentially a collective effort to fight crime in institutions of higher learning,” Lt Gen Nkhua said.

Outlining the security measures undertaken by the University to ensure a safe and secure learning and teaching environment, the UFS Vice Chancellor and Principal Prof Hestea C. Cloete said securing campuses and creating safe learning environments are vital prerequisites for achieving all of the other goals university management set for themselves.

“As a university, we will continue and where necessary intensify our various crime awareness and prevention campaigns to alert our campus community to be more vigilant. Our on-campus safety measures include, among others, a 24/7 access control by contracted security officers; a 24/7 CCTV monitoring; a 24/7 Security Operational Centre for real-time reporting of incidents and emergencies; response officers who respond to suspicious activities identified by control room operators; red-pole panic alarms fitted with cameras; security officers deployed at student residences at night; and intruder and fire detection systems in most of our buildings. Among our off-campus security measures include crime stop WhatsApp groups for real-time reporting of and response to incidents; dedicated off-campus vehicles to provide humanitarian assistance to students in need; accreditation of off-campus residences to ensure that they adhere to safety protocols; contracted armed-response private security companies who respond to off-campus incidents on a 24/7 basis and also conduct visible patrols and an appointed off-campus security liaison officer to assist with reporting incidents to the SAPS. We are fortunate to enjoy an excellent relationship with the SAPS and the various community policing.”

Various institutions of higher learning such as the University of Limpopo, Rhodes University, Tshwane University of Technology, Central University of Technology and other TEVT Colleges sent their representatives to witness the inauguration of the Campus Safety Forum while others participated through virtual platform.

LAW ENFORCEMENT TACKLING SAFETY IN SCHOOLS

In a significant step towards improving safety in schools, the Deputy Minister of Police, Mr Cassel Mathale, recently held a comprehensive Crime Prevention Engagement, School Safety Programme, and Career Exhibition in Barberton recently.

These initiatives are aimed at tackling the rising concerns around safety in schools, strengthen crime prevention efforts, promote safer learning environments, and expose young people to career paths within the South African Police Service (SAPS). Also to reinforce the role of law enforcement in community development.

The safety of learners in and around schools has been a growing concern in the country, with incidents of violence, bullying, and substance abuse in educational institutions making headlines.

Deputy Minister Mathale consistently emphasised the importance of safeguarding young people. By hosting this initiative, Minister Mathale demonstrated the commitment of the Police Ministry to collaborate with other sectors to ensure that schools remain places of safety and learning.

In his address, Minister Mathale stressed that ensuring school safety is not just the responsibility of school staff or law enforcement but is a shared duty within the broader community. He further urged learners to be committed to their school work and not let temporary joys of life destroy their future.

“The safety of our children is paramount, and it requires us all as parents, teachers, law enforcement, and the community to play an active role. To the learners, you will have enough time to have fun, however now you need to be married to your books and equip yourself appropriately so you can play a role toward economic liberation” Mr Mathale said.

He also urged the learners to stay away from criminal activities, stating that there is no grave for a person who read their books, but there are early graves for bullies and drug abusers.

The Community engagement ensued where the Deputy Minister Mathale together with the Mpumalanga Acting Provincial Commissioner, Major General (Dr) Zeph Mkhwanazi and the Component Head: Social Crime Prevention, Major General Thokozani Mathonsi played a crucial role in facilitating discussions and offering

valuable insights on improving community policing initiatives and service delivery. The programme brought together key stakeholders, including law enforcement officers, educators, parents, community leaders, and students, to engage in meaningful conversations about creating safer learning environments. The Deputy Minister of Social Development Mr Ganief Hendricks was also there to offer his support for the initiative.

Their presence underscored the commitment of the police to work closely with communities, schools, and local authorities in tackling safety concerns. Their involvement further reinforced the message that the SAPS is dedicated to ensuring schools and community safety and is committed to creating a secure environment for all.

As part of the School Safety Programme, career exhibition stalls were set up at the Kamhola High School to inspire learners and provide them with insights into the diverse career opportunities within the SAPS. Police officers from various units were present to discuss the range of roles available, from visible policing, forensic specialists, engineers, mounted unit and investigators.

The stalls were aimed to ignite interest in policing as a career and motivate learners to consider joining the SAPS in the future. The learners were also presented with school shoes, sanitary pads, single plate cookers and cleaning soap.

These sentiments by the Minister of Police implored and added a drive into encouraging the component to put the work session's recommendations related to their scope of work to practice.

The focus of the work session was on the following various areas of Transformation and Diversity Management:

- Policy on Diversity Management and Inclusion in the Workplace, Policy Number 2/2024
- Sexual Harassment Policy, SSSBC Agreement 1/2011
- Job Access Strategic Framework and White Paper on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities
- Employment Equity Act 55 of 1998 as amended and Provision of reasonable accommodation.

Welcoming over 100 members from various Business Units within different Divisions and Components from the National Head Office, Component Head: Labour Relations and Transformation, Major General (Maj Gen) Joy Motubatsi told those in attendance that everyone will leave to their various Divisions and Components with an understanding of what is expected of them. "We are going to outline and to ensure that we all understand the policies, framework and regulations that guides us, because not understanding them make us not to be able to execute our responsibilities adequately," emphasised Maj Gen Motubatsi.

She further stressed that it is the responsibility of Division: Human Resource Management to ensure effective and efficient utilisation of the workforce. To also educate employees about management of diversity, raise awareness of potential biases and stereotypes, and equip employees with the required skills to interact effectively and respectfully with other employees from diverse

"As functionaries, we are saying from the Minister's session at Birchwood in February, let us find synergy in addressing and ensuring that we lift up the bar in terms of our responsibilities in view of the changes that are happening in the legislation from the promulgation of the President's regulation in terms of Employment Equity. There are changes that will be effected with regard to our Employment Equity Plan going forward," highlighted Maj Gen Motubatsi.

The work session further sought to instil a culture of monitoring and evaluation of transformation and diversity in the workplace.

Brigadier Elona Njikela, Section Head: Transformation and Diversity Management sensitized Business Units through various presentations and also touched base on the National Development Plan "Vision 2030" and reminding members that the deadline is only five years away, but not much has been done.

"We are left with five years to 2030 but the girl child still does not feel free to walk in the streets. It is up to us to change the status quo of our country and make sure that our girl child and everyone feel safe to be in this country, because if people don't feel safe it will deter investors," said Brigadier Njikela.

The Section Head further visited the Constitution and raised awareness into rights such as Human, Social and Political Rights among others. She spoke strongly against the marginalization of persons with disabilities including access to SAPS' buildings in general. The work session concluded with a clear understanding of reaching out to all SAPS members and sensitize them about the looming transformation, policies, and regulations affecting all and sundry in the entire organisation.

The theme for World Social Work Day on 18 March 2025 is - 'Strengthening Intergenerational Solidarity for Enduring Wellbeing'. It emphasises the importance of caring and respecting across generations to build strong societies, sustain the environment, and share wisdom for a better future.

THE THEME HIGHLIGHTS THAT:

- 1) Care is everyone's responsibility.
- 2) Intergenerational solidarity speaks to the economic and environmental challenges we face, as each generation needs to act in relationship with the environments in which we live so that future generations can inherit healthy and sustainable economic and ecological environments.
- 3) The theme recognises the importance of not only the transfer of knowledge, but also valuing the wisdom elders provide and acknowledging the role younger generations have to interpret the wisdom in new ways, to fit today's challenges to find new solutions for the future.

This is depicted in the design of the poster which recognises the role social workers play in supporting the diverse range of care arrangements.

only exist to serve others, but also to be sustained. Not just survive, but to thrive. And, ultimately, as fully human beings: to flourish.

As reflective journal writing evokes mindfulness and helps writers remain present while keeping perspective, you are urged to not only walk a mile in the shoes of a social worker, but to also make use of this opportunity to learn a skill for emotional catharsis that helps the brain regulate emotions and aids well-being.

REFLECTIVE JOURNAL WRITING

As social workers, we are often the story keepers of our client's painful experiences. We listen with empathy to countless stories of trauma, loss, betrayal, and violation. Of course within these stories are also incredible examples of resiliency and the strength of the human spirit. The bearing witness we do can lead to the occupational

hazards of professional burnout (characterised in part by emotional exhaustion), vicarious trauma, and compassion fatigue.

To prevent these hazards, social workers must have a way of processing the emotions relevant to the nature of the work which (at its heart) can be referred to as “emotional labour.” William Kahn, suggests that caregivers must unpack their emotions and experiences as one might unpack a suitcase, carefully laying out and examining its contents. They must reflect on what they feel and examine their reactions to certain people and events.

Meaningful and consistent self-reflection is important to maintaining the necessary emotional and professional boundaries that are foundational to quality social work practice and also serve them well in all areas of their lives. Self-reflection also facilitates personal growth through fostering new insights, learning and “aha moments” that can improve their lives and inspire them.

Where to start with journal writing? Simply get a pen, a notebook and schedule at least fifteen minutes a day to go to the page to observe, know, grow, and care for yourself through journaling. Journal writing helps you align with your core values, reflect on what really matters, and can support you to stay grounded and centred in the midst of it all. Journaling is relational, it is a give and take creative process that allows you to deepen your relationship with yourself, with others and the world in which you live. We have to accept ourselves in order to write. Now none of us does that fully; few of us do it even halfway, but do not wait for it before you write as the process of writing will teach you about acceptance.

Writing can enhance resiliency - Research suggests that a resilient social worker must be able to:

- Balance self-care with caring for others
- Create and maintain emotional boundaries (attach — involve — separate)
- Deepen self-awareness through regular self-reflection
- Process difficult emotions
- Reduce and/or manage stress effectively
- Stay connected to meaning and purpose
- Cultivate optimism, inspiration and hope — within oneself and to be a catalyst for these virtues in the people and missions we serve.

Reflective journal writing can help facilitate all seven areas of resiliency and well-being.

Do use your journal as a creative, soulful and nourishing space to help you allow more gratitude, joy, curiosity, energy, vitality, hope, patience, and whatever else you might want more of in your life. May the transformative power of reflective journal writing nourish your spirit and help fill your emotional cup — again and again!

SAPS PROMOTES A HEALTHY LIFESTYLE AND PHYSICAL FITNESS TO MEMBERS

Members are encouraged to exercise and be fit at all times for a healthy lifestyle.

All SAPS Act members, including lateral appointment without Basic Police Training Development were summoned to a summative fitness assessment to promote a healthy lifestyle. "Our members are not taking their physical fitness seriously, especially those that are in support environment. Physical fitness assessors should play a leading role and encourage members to adopt a healthy lifestyle," said Fitness Assessor, Capt Xolisile Peter from Corporate Support. He was speaking to this publication at a recent Fitness Assessment that took place at the SAPS' Division: Supply Chain Management grounds in Silverton, Tshwane.

"Physically fit members portray a positive image of the organisation and ultimately instill confidence in the communities to trust the police," Capt Peter asserted. He mentioned that in line with the National Instruction 03 of 2023, physical assessment of members must be conducted once in financial year. In this financial year 2024/25 a handful of 118 members participated in the programme and that Corporate Support is responsible for the coordination and facilitation for all head office components.

The physical assessment exercise was divided into three components, namely, Body Composition: testing of blood pressure (BP); weight, height and waist circumference – to determine the Body Mass Index (BMI) and Physical Fitness which comprised of a pacer test or a 1.6 km walk, muscular strength and endurance including 1 minute push-ups and 1 minute sit-ups which everyone underwent.

Physical fitness is an important part of any police official and members are encouraged to be physically fit as there will always be a potential need in their line of duty to utilise physical efforts in the execution of their duties. However, Capt Peter stressed the fact that only just over a hundred of members underwent the programme, saying: "it is vital that we must go through this process every financial year and take good care of our bodies."

High risk members and members with disabilities were also encouraged to attend as they were accommodated accordingly during the assessment. They were assessed on health or body composition.
